Affordable Homeownership = Brighter Futures

The holiday season is a time of reflection, celebration, and gratitude. Thanks to the hard work and kindness of our volunteers and community partners, seven new partner families will be home for the holidays this year. We are growing as a Habitat affiliate, and our community will be stronger because of the contributions those households will make in the coming years. We are thankful for our new families, and the hands and hearts that helped them along the way.

We are also mindful of the folks that still need us. 39% of Connecticut's households live just above, at, or below the poverty line, and can't afford necessities. In New London, where the median rent for a 2-bedroom rental is \$1,600/month, that percentage jumps to 56%. Even if a family scrapes enough together for rent, there's not enough supply; as of this month, only 26 units are listed in the New London rental market.

Finding a rental doesn't ensure long-term security. Rental rates have increased over 6% this year, almost \$100/month. There's nothing to prevent continuing rate hikes, nor are there any assurances quality of life within the rental will improve. Along with rising utility costs and inflation, worry and anguish often prevail under the expensive roof.

We believe that affordable homeownership should be a higher priority on the minds and desks of our local, state, and federal governments. Habitat's affordable mortgage program isn't just about lowering the cost of a safe, stable place to live. With a lower monthly payment at a fixed rate, households can now budget better, plan, and even save. Out from a rental's grip, families can focus on their health, education, employment, and each other. Affordable homeownership means brighter futures for children and their families.

The seven new homes represent a slight increase over last year, illustrating our goal to welcome more families to the program each year. There's still so much to be done, but if we work together to give just as generously to those in need as we give to those we know, we can build more homes, strengthen more communities, and provide more hope to our neighbors in eastern Connecticut.

You can help! If affordable homeownership is to be as familiar a term as affordable housing, it needs to be introduced into headlines, newsreels, and conversations. If you're reading an article or having a discussion, try replacing "housing" with "homeownership", and think of the families that no longer sacrifice food or fuel for their next mortgage payment.

Thank you for your role in building a brighter and better future.


In Connecticut,




1 IN 6 HOUSEHOLDS

Lower-income households are especially likely to have unaffordable housing costs, requiring more than 30% of their income. This includes many facing severe cost burdens, requiring more than 50% of their income.

Minimum wage: \$14.00/hour 2


Increasingly, renters can't afford the typical home price.

Advocating for Habitat

It's easy to support the mission-driven work that we do on behalf of low-income families. Certainly donating your time, talent, and treasure are great ways to get started. But, did you know you can do more?

Simply sharing our social media posts, talking to your circle of influence about the realities of the needs of local families helps bring the topic to the forefront. Nearly 1 in 6 households in the U.S. pay half or more of their income on a place to live, an issue only heightened by the COVID-19 pandemic. While many are paying high rent, they are often living in sub-standard conditions. So not only are they paying more than they can afford, they are living in unsafe, unhealthy spaces.

Through our interactive *Cost of Home* experience, you can walk through the decisions a household has to make as they work to cover high rent and all the other costs. If it were you, what decisions would you make?

Where Are They Now?

Amna and Ezairig Homeowner Partner Family December 2020

Amna and Ezairig left their native Sudan for the safety of Egypt when they started their family. With exhausted resources and a changing political climate, they decided to leave Egypt and began the three-year process of entering the United States as refugees. They arrived in New York City in July 2016 with their two oldest children. With the help of the non-profit organization Start Fresh, they settled into an apartment in New London. Learning about the Habitat program gave them the access to homeownership that they needed for their growing family.

Since the family of 7 moved in a few years ago, then they frequently attend other Habitat home dedications, and help with sweat equity for friends and their families, whom they have recruited for the program. Their family has grown and they are thriving.

Their oldest daughter, Enna (20), is a student at UCONN after attending the Science and Technology School in New London. Both Sadeya (17) and Zobaida (15) are at Norwich Free Academy, which is not far from their home. Ali (11) goes to Teachers Memorial Middle School and is doing well in school, as are all of his siblings. Amna works at the New London Day Nursery, a program of the Child and Family Agency of southeast Connecticut, which their youngest child, Amir (3), also attends.

Amna says she loves everything about their new home, but especially important is having enough space for the children to do their homework, and a backyard where they play in a safe environment. The financial classes helped prepare them for homeownership, which is a big adjustment from years of renting substandard apartments.

They have certainly come a long way from the unmaintained, bug-infested one-bedroom apartment in Egypt where the only heat source was an old portable electric heater. Their family is faith in action, trusting that a better life was possible.

"Because of this house we feel settled, comfortable and safe. We have friends next door and in Greeneville. We have a better life," says Amna.

Habitat for Humanity of Eastern Connecticut, incorporated in 1987, has built or refurbished 107 homes in our 36 year history, to date. Follow the stories of our families in our newsletters and on Facebook, Instagram, and LinkedIn.

I love seeing it come to a wonderful finish for them."



Habitat Honors a Life of Service



"We grieve the loss of Mrs. Carter and our prayers are with President Carter and their family. Mrs. Carter has helped change the lives of thousands of homeowners, empowered countless women and inspired millions of people. Over the years, she has blessed us with her compassion for serving others and commitment to improving housing conditions," said Jonathan Reckford, CEO, Habitat for Humanity International. "The Carters lent a hand to Habitat for Humanity as a young, fledging organization and created global awareness of our work and of our mission."

After leaving the White House, the Carters planned for meaningful ways to continue their commitment to social justice and basic human rights. Their first volunteer experience with Habitat for Humanity was in March 1984 near their home in Americus, Georgia, where Habitat for Humanity was founded. Later that same year, the Carters joined Habitat volunteers in New York City's Lower East Side to renovate an abandoned building in partnership with families in need of affordable housing. That marked Habitat for Humanity's first Jimmy Carter Work Project, which was later renamed to the Jimmy & Rosalynn Carter Work Project. Since then, President and Mrs. Carter have worked with more than 104,000 volunteers across the U.S. and in 14 countries to build, renovate and repair 4,390 Habitat homes. Since its founding in 1976, Habitat has served more than 46 million people around the world.

In 2016, Habitat named President and Mrs. Carter as the inaugural Habitat Humanitarians for their extraordinary dedication to service in alignment with Habitat's vision of a world where everyone has a decent place to live. "We are grateful for the incredible impact she and President Carter have had on Habitat and on the families who have benefited from their shining example," said Reckford.

At the Affiliate Conference in Atlanta in 2022, Habitat International's leaders and representatives from more than 2,000 affiliates around the world gathered for education, inspiration, and fellowship. 
